## Promises on Which You Can Bank, Pt 2

2 Timothy 2:11-13

**Keywords:** Salvation, Reigning with Christ, Died with Christ, Apostasy, Faithfulness

**SermonAudio Blurb:** Paul brings to an end a key section of this final letter. He does so through apparently quoting an ancient hymn that sums up the various experiences of a professing Christian, but more importantly key promises given by God.

### I. Introduction.

Fire Alarm, Baby Battles

#### A. The video of the man with cerebral palsy.

1. Would have committed suicide if not for Jesus.
2. Jesus changes everything to those who believe.
3. But why?

#### B. A theology of waiting.

1. When you read the Apostle Paul you will not have to work real hard to realize that he has a very well-developed theology waiting.
2. Why? Suffering and persecution. Which is the answer for the man with cerebral palsy.
3. Quick overview:
  - a. Romans 8:19,23, 25.
  - b. ~~1 Corinthians 4:5.~~ 1 CO 1:7 (start vs 4)
  - c. Galatians 5:5.
  - d. Philippians 3:20.
  - e. 1 Thessalonians 1:10. *most*
4. These are not just nice little passages. They are climaxes to various arguments that Paul is carefully making.
5. For Paul, the motivation for much, if not all, that he does is based upon the idea of waiting for what the bible calls the "blessed hope" of Christ making all things new.

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6. The difference between pagan and the Christian, in the mind of Paul, is that their hope ultimately is based on appetites that are filled here and now; while the Christian waits for the day the Jesus saves His people and creates a new heaven and earth.
  7. Beloved, all of this to say that the more comfortable you are in this age the less you shall long for the day of His return. But the greater your persecution and your suffering the greater shall be your yearning to echo the words of John in Revelation, "Even so Lord come quickly."
- C. All of this prepares us to consider our passage today. It is all future oriented, connected to Christ's kingdom or final judgment.
- D. And in all of this he gives us promises that we can bank on. Promises that are so massive that if we understand them and the better we get them I think it will help us in how we orient our lives.
- II. If you are Christ's then you cannot lose (11-12a).
- A. Paul points Timothy back to his conversion here. And then takes him to his current situation in the first part of 12. It is designed to encourage and strengthen.
- B. We died with Christ . . . .
1. Some take this to refer to a martyr's death but that is doubtful.
  2. Better is the understanding of what actually happens at your conversion.
  3. To "die with Christ" is something Paul teaches in connection to our union with Christ (Romans 6:3-5, 8, 11; 7:4-6; Galatians 2:20 3:3)
  4. When Christ died for our sins upon the cross, God the Father counted this as our death. Each believer then must by faith reckon themselves that death to be actual fact (Romans 6:11; Colossians 3:5).
  5. What happens in our conversion to Jesus Christ is that we are infinitely and intimately connected to Him. What is His is ours. (I plan on teaching specifically on this very subject next week)
  6. Our life is intimately connected to Jesus. In John He describes himself as the vine and we are the branches. In Colossians 3 he is life itself. In Ephesians 5 he is the head of His body, the church. In 1 Peter 1 he is the corner stone off of which all of us are built up into the temple of God.
  7. As a result the bible makes it clear that if we died with Jesus, we are also raised with Him.

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- C. Assuming that this is true in the life of the person claiming to be saved then the consequence naturally follows. We will live with Him.
1. Just as sure as Christ died and then rose, so too we shall rise if in Christ.
    - a. Therefore if you have been raised up with Christ, keep seeking the things above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your mind on the things above, not on the things that are on earth. (Colossians 3:1-2)
    - b. For God, who said, "Light shall shine out of darkness," is the One who has shone in our hearts to give the Light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Christ. But we have this treasure in earthen vessels, so that the surpassing greatness of the power will be of God and not from ourselves; we are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not despairing; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; always carrying about in the body the dying of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus also may be manifested in our body. For we who live are constantly being delivered over to death for Jesus' sake, so that the life of Jesus also may be manifested in our mortal flesh. (2 Corinthians 4:6-11)
  2. In times of sadness and depression we can wonder if we will stay true when faced with dying because of Jesus. The answer is impossible to know.
  3. The best way to know this would be: recognize that God gives us grace as it is needed and not before then; and, the better question is are you daily dying to this world because you are dead to sin with Christ?
- D. To daily die to this world requires that we start with the mind.
1. Romans 6:11 with 12:1-2.
  2. Then and only then can we begin to consider what that looks like in our lives (cf. Romans 6:13).
- E. Jim Elliot, who died without ever having the chance to bring the gospel to the people he went to. A man who died by their hands said these famous words, "He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep to gain what he cannot lose."
- F. But he also says in 12a that there is great value in enduring as well.
1. Here he moves us to the daily life of a Christian.
  2. We remember first that we died with Christ to this world and to sin. Then we get on with the business of living a life of enduring faith with a clear focus on the reward.

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3. The verb for "endure" is the same as what was used in vs 10 and this is why he is likely quoting this hymn.
  - a. It is a broad principle that all Christians will have to endure in various ways as Christians.
  - b. This passage is one that gives us the promise of future grace by pointing us beyond the suffering/enduring and to the reward.
  - c. The promise is to share in the reigning of Christ. This first was promised by Jesus on earth: "just as My Father has granted Me a kingdom, I grant you that you may eat and drink at My table in My kingdom, and you will sit on thrones judging the twelve tribes of Israel. (Luke 22:29-30)
  - d. And later, after his resurrection:
    - (1) The one who conquers and who keeps my works until the end, to him I will give authority over the nations, (Revelation 2:26)
    - (2) He who overcomes, I will grant to him to sit down with Me on My throne, as I also overcame and sat down with My Father on His throne. (Revelation 3:21)
    - (3) This was also taught by the apostles:
      - (a) 1 Corinthians 6:2 Or do you not know that the saints will judge the world?
      - (b) Revelation 20:4, 6.
        - i) This passage is key to understand our future in Jesus Christ.
        - ii) The next major event to come is the return of Jesus to establish His kingdom on this earth. Old Testament prophets all speak of this time.
        - iii) After his death and resurrection, Peter and the other apostles thought it might be time at that point that he establish it: "To these He also presented Himself alive after His suffering, by many convincing proofs,

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appearing to them over a period of forty days and speaking of the things concerning the kingdom of God. . . . So when they had come together, they were asking Him, saying, "Lord, is it at this time You are restoring the kingdom to Israel?" He said to them, "It is not for you to know times or epochs which the Father has fixed by His own authority; but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be My witnesses both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and even to the remotest part of the earth." (Act 1:3, 6-8)

- iv) We learned in our time in Romans 11 that what God is doing now in the world is gathering non-Jews (Gentiles) to Himself. And then He shall draw the nation of Israel back to Him through Jesus Christ.
- v) But prior to that Jesus shall call His Church, His Bride to His side. We shall be changed and we will return with Him. And it is here that our reign shall begin, overseeing His reign upon all the earth centered in Jerusalem.

- 4. This promise is huge when you face the shaming and affliction the world will give.
  - a. Hebrews 11 has people who the world did not see as worth anything—other than persecution and destruction.
  - b. Yet these same persecuted men and women, most of whom we know nothing about, the persecutors were not worthy to know.
  - c. Those who reigned over and destroyed the physical lives of countless men and women shall ultimately see these same people resurrected and sharing in the glory of our Lord.
  - d. When Christ who is your life appears, then you also will appear with him in glory. (Colossians 3:4)

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- G. So Paul starts with words of great encouragement and now he gives us a strong word of warning.

## III. If you abandon Jesus you can only lose (12b).

- A. Here are the consequences of not enduring. And it gives us a sense of what not enduring means--denying your Lord.
- B. The path for a Christian is a fixed path, it starts with a cross and then a crown. Now Paul takes us to the idea of what happens to the one who does not endure but rather he denies.
  - 1. To deny here means to renounce or disown. It is that terrible moment when a person who has confessed Jesus says he is done.
    - a. He walks away and denies Jesus.
    - b. Hebrews 10 says that there no longer remains a sacrifice for his sin, for he has rejected and turned his back on the one true sacrifice.
    - c. This is the lot of people like Judas, who for 30 pieces of silver he betrayed the One who did him only good.
  - 2. If we deny Jesus then He shall be the one who denies us (think Matthew 7:21) and it will be a testimony of denial before His Father.
  - 3. This is not always clear for us and we need to be careful. The parable of Tares reminds us that all is not as it appears.
  - 4. Nor should we assume that somehow the warnings in Jude and 2 Peter have nothing to do with us.
  - 5. Matthew 10:32, "Everyone therefore who shall confess Me before men, I will also confess him before My Father who is in heaven, but whoever shall deny Me before men, I will also deny him before My Father who is in heaven."
- C. I think here is a good place to speak briefly on the nature of what the gospel demands of those who hear it.
  - 1. It is nothing less that a call to believe that Jesus truly is the Risen Lord and is our Sovereign King and to follow Him in that light.
  - 2. It is in contradistinction to the foolish idea of "making a decision" or "asking Jesus into your heart" where the focus is on you and your decision rather

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than the person and work of Jesus and the natural demands that are connected to it.

3. MacArthur makes a helpful point here: " Accepting Christ is not really used in Scripture. What the Scripture does in inviting a person to Christ is call them to be a follower of Jesus Christ. That's the issue. You don't say to someone, "Jesus died and Jesus rose again and He wants to change your life. If you just accept Him He'll change your life." That's simply a short-term kind of thing, you just do this and you'll get that. That is a very confusing thing and that kind of evangelism, I think, has produced a lot of still-births. What we should say to people is if you believe that Jesus is the Son of God who died and rose again, if you believe that He's the Savior who paid the penalty for your sin, if you believe that He desires to forgive you and you are willing to follow Him in obedience and live to His glory, then come and follow Christ. We should be calling people to discipleship, not to decisions. We should be calling people to follow Christ, not accept Christ. And we see here again that you will reign if you continue under persecution faithful to Christ, if you're a follower. No one is elect who does not endure."

## **IV. If you struggle in your faith you will find that Jesus supports you (13).**

- A. Here we find him ending with a word of hope and encouragement.
- B. Some see this verse as saying that if you have no faith, Jesus is still faithful in that He shall judge and punish you. I don't think that is the point at all.
- C. Instead, it had in view the idea that points to those lapses of loyalty to Christ.
  1. This could be a good word of encouragement to repent and return for the many who have fled and abandoned Paul in his shame.
  2. When the bible speaks of God's faithfulness it is almost always in the fact that he is utterly faithful to his promises. And that is bound up in his nature, he cannot deny himself.
- D. If it is a promise then it speaks to the persevering work of Jesus in the lives of His people.
  1. All Christians experience times of faithlessness.
  2. It is not a denial of Jesus, it is the battle of continuing in faith in those multitude of ways all of you experience.

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- E. He is unable to deny himself because salvation is ultimately rooted in the faithfulness of God. Praise God that this is true.
  - F. This reminds us of the essence of the gospel message, that though we were dead and helpless, enemies of God; He in his rich mercy came to us through His Son Jesus and lifted us up and said, "Live."
- V. **Conclusion.**
- A. So I remind you of the verses I quoted at the beginning and I tell you that there is nothing you will lose in following Jesus to the end.
  - B. Fight the good fight, run the race set before you in endurance for in the end you shall live and reign and delight yourself for all eternity in the one person who truly satisfies.
